Here I Stand!

These are remarkable historical words. They came from the lips of Dr. Martin Luther at the Diet of Worms. No, it was not a Diet like we understand a Diet, rather a council. Emperor Charles V had summoned Luther to Worms concerning his teachings and writings. He was asked to recant his writings. Finally Luther said something along these lines.

"Unless I am shown where my writings are contrary to the Word of God...I cannot and I will not recant. Here I stand I can do no other. So help me God!"

Times really have not changed. It is still the Word of God on which we stand. This Word and the consistent principals that go with it often run contrary to our culture. So it was in the days of the early church.

"For the time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear. They will turn their ears away from the truth and turn aside to myths."

2 Timothy 4:3-4

Sound Doctrine—all churches have teachings. Actually, every organization has principals on which they function. We call our teachings "Doctrine". What might be some key Biblical Lutheran doctrines—

The Triune God

The Two natures of Christ

That Christ's death paid the Ransom for sin

That Christ rose from Death

That Life Begins at Conception

That Baptism brings regeneration

That infants should be Baptized

That Christ is really present in the Sacrament of Holy Communion

These are a few, yet they are some very core Doctrines.

We also believe in the Order of Creation, that Adam & Eve were created by God as a historical human

male and a historical human female. We therefore believe what scriptures say about marriage:

"For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and they will become one flesh." Genesis 2:24

It is because of the scriptures that we establish doctrine and based on good, sound Biblical teachings a church develops a polity of how it practices good order in the life of the church.

The doctrine of Christ's Church and the polity of a Christian congregation may not always square with the world's culture. We see that more and more. It is much like a buffet. People pick and choose, hence Paul's words again,

"For the time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear. They will turn their ears away from the truth and turn aside to myths."

2 Timothy 4:3-4

Which brings us to one last thought about doctrine. We believe, teach, and confess that the Bible is the Word of God. The Word of God should always be our guide, not culture, about our church teachings and life decisions.

Hence, sometimes we must simply preach up, pray up, and stand up for truth. Luther did long ago, Jesus did so long before Luther and the prophets like Amos even before Jesus.

So as Fall now comes upon us be steadfast in worship, strive to be here every Sunday and seize an opportunity to study the Word in one of our many studies

Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church, UAC, Pierre, SD, we stand for something, we really do.

We believe, we teach, we confess. Please take the enclosed Luther seal and place it on your fridge as a constant reminder of the sound Biblical Doctrine upon which our Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod is founded and continues to proclaim,

Bank West Short-term loan As of our 8/8/10 Board of Stewardship meeting, another \$5,500.00 has been paid toward our Bank West loan. The \$56,000 loan has now been reduced to \$39,500 in the last two months. We do have some interest to pay over and above that amount.

It's complete! The last touch is done in the St. Matthew room. Vern & A.J. Lenz took the cabinets that were in the old office workroom and with some mighty fine carpentry and a new counter top have successfully provided a wonderful cabinet unit complete with a bulletin board. Thanks Vern & A.J. for a job very nicely done!

St. Mark Update Leidholt, Mc Neely & Leidholt have run the duct work and the vents in the St. Mark Room. The HVAC for this room is now complete. The wall boxes and lights have been installed. This was a gift from Todd's Electric. Mark Undeberg and Jay Fredrich have sealed the floor in the St. Mark Room.

What about the St. Luke, John, & Paul rooms? These cannot be completed until the elevator is installed as per building codes for the City of Pierre. Once the Bank West loan is retired, an elevator fund will be started.

Operation Christmas Child

Priscilla Circle is sponsoring a project this year called "Operation Christmas Child" or the "Shoebox Project".

We will be collecting items (that are listed below) and placing them in a "shoe box" (regular size shoe box or small plastic container about the size of a shoe box). Then these gifts will be shipped overseas for underprivileged children or children who were victims of earthquakes, etc.

If anyone would like to join us in this, you may drop your filled box (marked with age group and if for a girl or boy) or you may just purchase some items (there will be a drop box marked for this) and we will get them ready. Another way you could help would be monetary. This would help with the shipping or buying items to finish a shoe box. It costs us \$7.00 per box to ship.

The children's age categories are 2-4, 5-9, 10-14—girl or boy. The labels for the boxes may be gotten at the church. The boxes should not be sealed, just a rubber band around them.

The Project will start September 1 and will run to October 31. We encourage all members to join us in this endeavor and put a smile on some children's faces

GIFT IDEAS:

<u>SCHOOL SUPPLIES:</u> pens. Pencils and sharpeners, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

<u>TOYS:</u> small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small Etch-A-Sketch, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky, etc.

<u>HYGIENE ITEMS</u>: tooth brush, tooth paste, mild bar soap (in a plastic zip bag), comb, washcloth, etc.

OTHER: hard candy or lollipops (please double bag these) mints, gum, T-shirts, socks, ball caps, sunglasses, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches, flashlights (with extra batteries).

In a separate envelope, you may enclose a note to

the child and a photo of yourself or your family (If you include your name and address the child may write back).

<u>DO NOT INCLUDE:</u> Used or damaged items, war related items such as toy guns, knives, military figures, chocolate or food, out of date candy, liquids or lotions, medications or vitamins, breakable items such as water globes or glass containers, aerosol cans.

Central Thought

When a pastor prepares a sermon there are a lot of components. Yet the common element of most sermons was the Seminary teaching of have a "central thought."

For the past four years we have had a central thought, "Thus Far".

It was from a remarkable Biblical text:

Then Samuel took a stone and set it up between Mizpah and Shen. He named it Ebenezer, saying, "Thus far has the Lord helped us." I Samuel 7:12

It served our "Building Together in Faith" focus in a Biblical inspiring nature. Our Ebenezer stone in Grace Plaza will be a powerful reminder of this place of our congregation's history for decades and decades, perhaps even to Christ's return.

This year three words capture our Central Thought, "Community, Growth, Gratitude." This is a terrific central thought given to us by Karen Lindbloom.

Community—We do serve our community in many ways. In what new ways can we as a congregation serve our community and can our new Christian Family Life Center be helpful to that?

Growth—Yes we want to continue to grow. We want to grow in faith, grow in the scriptures, grow in discipleship and yes grow in numbers!

Gratitude—Yes we shall be a people of gratitude as we praise God steadfastly in worship, in our prayers and in our cheerful, thankful service of our loving God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

There will be the Ebenezer stone constantly reminding us this year of a very Christ-centered central thought.



Debt Retirement

We have 2 goals –

- 1st To retire the Bank West short-term note this fall. As of September 1, this \$56,000 loan has been reduced to \$49,000, to \$45,000, to \$39,500.
- 2nd To reduce our \$1,000,000 loan with the SD District Church Extension Fund. Because of special gifts and by taking two advanced payments from the Building Fund we have made, as of September 1, six advance payments.

What is an advanced payment? The Church Extension Fund provides us the opportunity to make advanced principal payments therefore saving the interest on that payment.

Savings? Yes, with our six advanced payments we have reduced the principal to \$989,755.02 and saved \$28,562.54 in interest.

Future Payments – We hope that each month we can make at least one advanced payment from either the Building Fund or the General Fund and additional payments as congregational gifts provide.

Charts-You will note the following charts that shows the first 10 payments and the last several payments. You will note the total interest on the million-dollar loan is \$1,097,145.95 if we don't pay ahead.

Hence – every dollar given toward our Building Fund/ Debt Retirement right now is like giving five extra dollars.

Grateful We are <u>grateful</u> that so many families have extended their giving!

COMMUNITY, GROWTH, GRATITUDE

"Let the desert and its towns raise their voices; let the settlements where Kedar lives rejoice. Let the people of Sela sing for joy; let them shout from the mountaintops." Isaiah 42:11

Community. I suspect that when we think of the word "community," general thoughts of city, town or village probably pop into our heads. Further consideration might bring forth ideas of public and society, sharing, or even common interests. Faith Lutheran Church is made up of a community of believers. Inside that general community are many other entities, separated by concerns, duties, responsibilities, functions, and assignments. One of these is our Music Community.

As we are about to launch fall programs and schedules, I began thinking of Faith's music ministry and its place in our community of believers. Not long ago, I was reading an article about current directions in church music, and Dr. Michael Burkhardt, internationally-known composer, choral clinician, organist and hymn festival leader, was asked what trends he thought would affect church music in the next five years. Surprisingly, or not surprisingly, these are his answers:

Increasing passivity in music making and participation;

Continued and increasing use of sound track accompaniment and full recordings as a substitute for the real thing;

Continued and increased displacement of the centrality of worship by other church activities and higher prioritization of other life activities.

It's disappointing to read something like that; yet, when I have gone about recruiting voices for the choir and approaching people to take part in our music ministry, I have been met with every imaginable response. They range from 1) I am too busy; 2) I've already put my time in over the years; 3) I don't want to sing at both services; 4) my family activities are my priority; 4) I'm not sure what I'm doing that weekend or I don't know my plans yet. 5) That's my bowling night, or I'm hunting; 6) The choir isn't as good as it used to be. The list goes on and on.

That's not to say that family and job responsibilities aren't important, because they are. However, God also called us to be servants, and the faithful serve God among the faith community as long as they're alive.

I would ask you to consider your musical gifts and the part they play in our Faith community of believers. First of all, your gifts are exactly that – they've been given to you. God determined and distributed them among his children. They weren't given for your own benefit, but for the benefit of others. When we use our gifts together, we all benefit. However, if you don't use your (musical) gift, others get cheated.

Community is one way we can surround and defeat our personal enemy, Satan. In our current climate and culture of "It's all about me; my needs and ambitions," we need to look out for the interests of others. We need to walk and work with others, and have others watch out for us, too. In order for the community to experience growth, the community must be nurtured. What better way to ward off the devil and express your love to God than by singing and making music! What better way of declaring gratitude to your Creator than by singing his praises! There have been more songs written about Jesus Christ than any other topic in the world.

I am extremely grateful for those individuals who take an hour or so each week to come to choir rehearsal; for willing accompanists; for those who make time in their schedules to ring bells, to practice a solo or come to an ensemble rehearsal; for those who say, "Yes, I think I can make that work!"

"Praise the Lord. How good it is to sing praises to our God, how pleasant and fitting to praise Him! Sing to the Lord with thanksgiving, make music to our God on the harp!"


