Palm Sunday, April 9th at 6:30 PM

The Last Supper will come alive at Faith Lutheran on Sunday, April 9 in a dramatic musical experience presented by members of the Faith Lutheran Congregation and the Faith Choir.

"The Living Last Supper" is a live re-enactment of the classic mural painting by Leonardo da Vinci. It portrays the night in which Jesus and His disciples gathered in the upper room on the eve of the crucifixion. It is where Jesus ate one final meal with His closest companions, and where He revealed that one of them will betray Him before the night is over. We will hear from each of the disciples, and listen to the story from their perspective. The choir will offer several inspirational anthems.

Following the presentation, there will be an opportunity for light refreshments and fellowship.

⁵ But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you seek Jesus who was crucified. ⁶ He is not here, for he has risen, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. ⁷ Then go quickly and tell his disciples that he has risen from the dead, and behold, he is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him. See, I have told you." ⁸ So they departed quickly from the tomb with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. (Matt 28:5-8)

wouldn't tremble and be afraid! Think about it. You go to anoint a body to prepare it for a proper burial, but the body is missing. Then some ethereal creature tells you the body isn't there because it is no longer dead but alive! Who could take it in? "Do not be afraid" the man in white said. Yeah, right! Then again, perhaps the women remembered the thousands He had fed with only two fish and five loaves of bread (Matthew 14:15-21). Maybe they thought again about the raising of Lazarus from the dead (John 11:38-44). After all, He was the one who had stilled the raging sea (Mark 4:35-41).

Somewhere, sometime, that trembling and bewilderment turned to joy and faith, for they did go tell His disciples and Peter (Matthew 28:8). And Jesus met them and greeted them, and they worshiped Him. "Then Jesus said to them, 'Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers..." (Matthew 28:9–10).

Jesus' last command is the same as this one: Don't be afraid. Go and tell. We can un-

derstand the fear of the women at the empty tomb. What are we afraid of? Trouble? Or hardship? Persecution? Or Famine? Nakedness? Or danger? Or sword? There is no fear in these things! "No in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him Who loved us" (Romans 8.35, 37). We have the benefit of history. The women at the tomb couldn't fathom the outcome, but we have God's Word that assures us of our victory in Christ. We have His promise, "And behold I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:20). So don't be afraid! Go and tell!



"JUST FOUR LITTLE WORDS"

"On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you!" John 20:19

From Jonah to Jesus, our Lenten Journey culminates in the glorious victory of Jesus' resurrection! We know how the story ends, but for those disciples locked in that room together after Jesus' crucifixion or traveling on the road to Emmaus, things seemed hopeless, desperate, and bleak. I can imagine that there was perhaps, one thought that kept going through their head. It's only 4 words long, but it's the same thought Adam and Eve had after they disobeyed God and ate from the fruit God had commanded them not to eat from. It's the same thought that went through the Israelites minds as they were trapped between the Red Sea and Pharaoh's army. It's the same thought of Jonah after he is tossed overboard into the raging sea and swallowed into the belly of the great fish. It's the same thought of the Emmaus travelers in Luke 24 upon discussing the events of Jesus' death. It's the same thought of the disciples in John 20, and it's even the same thought you and I have had before as well! How many of them, and us, have ever thought

these four words: "It's too late now!"?......or these four words: "What hope is left? What are we going to do now? We're toast! What could possibly fix the situation? For the disciples, their leader was dead, methodically executed like a criminal and silenced once and for all on the Roman cross. No more trouble should be coming from this rabble rouser! It's too late now, they thought, our teacher is dead, our hope for a deliverer crushed.

Locked in a room, fear-ful of what might happen, the disciples experience: helplessness, uncertainty, fear, grief, guilt, shame, blame, and a host of other feelings. We've felt these things before too. And then, when all hope seems lost, Jesus appears and brings with Him four glorious words of hope: Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!"

In our human despair, we sometimes cry out: "It's too late now!" but our hopelessness is completely unraveled by a Jesus who comes to us and says, "Peace be with you." The phrase: "It's too late now!" is met head on with four words of triumphant hope, four words of life: "Peace be with you!" Isn't that the great message of the Church? We as the church of God proclaim four words of

victory: "He's risen indeed, Alleluia!" Four words of encouragement: "We've only just begun." Four words of comfort: "Peace be with you." In Christ is our hope, our victory, and our salvation. So, people of God, see you in worship, not just on Easter, but each and every Sunday. For it is that day which stands as a "little Easter." Together as the people of God, we stand steadfastly on the victory of our Lord Jesus. We're not toast, far from it! As far as our work and life as a people of God here at Faith Lutheran, we've

WHAT ABOUT A NAME?

Jesus! Name of wondrous love, name all other names above, Unto which must ev'ry knee bow in deep humility.

Namedroppers. We all know them. They are those people who like to casually mention names of important or well-known people they know or claim to know, in order to impress others. Many times it's vanity, or perhaps it's insecurity about one's image that causes them to achieve a self-gratifying level of acceptance or an ego boost. I've found that it can be a common thread among music people.

Allow me to do a little namedropping. John Moriarty, affectionately known as "John B." to his students, was my high school band and choir director. A short, balding little man, he raised the quality, size and standards of bandmanship and choral music never attained in the history of the school. The band of 60+ members in grades 10-12, and the choir of 70+ voices consistently received superior ratings at the district and region-state level. Not too bad for a farming community of 1,000. Our music education, like the man himself, was characterized by strict discipline, sparkling humor, hard work and fun.

Art Nix was my mentor at Moorhead State University. He eschewed the title "Dr." Mr. Nix directed the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, taught

private woodwinds and instrumental conducting. He was tall and skinny, smoked a pipe; had a crew cut and a silly laugh. His favorite song was "Goober Peas," and his studio was a disaster. Once again, I learned what hard work was all about under the guidance of Mr. Nix. He paid strict attention to detail, detail and more detail. The man was ever gracious, always concluding a rehearsal with "Thank you very much." I hope I've acquired that habit.

Jack Noble was my organ prof during grad school at USD. He was a kind and gentle man with a quiet manner who championed church and classical music. Jack had suffered a Bell's Palsey at one time, and his facial muscles drooped on one side of his face. He rode a bicycle around campus when the weather was nice and had the worst handwriting ever. Under his tutelage I learned to be passionate, yet sensitive in my playing, and, you guessed it, more hard work and attention to detail.

All of these gentlemen were brilliant teachers, yet did not crave attention for themselves. They turned the attention on their students. They were good Christian men who led by example and firmly planted a work ethic in their students. I doubt that any of these three were ever the subject of a namedropping.

Jesus! Name of priceless worth to the fallen of the earth For the promise that it gave, "Jesus shall His people save."

So, what's happening when we speak Jesus' name in prayer? Namedropping? We don't imply a relationship. We who believe in Jesus are children of God – we pray as the Father's sons and daughters in Christ those He has chosen before time, rescued, and will be with for eternity. Seek Him authentically, and live out the power and authority of His Holy Name. No names – not one – have as much significance as the name of Jesus. The name of Jesus carries authority (remember when the storm ceased), has power, and wins salvation. Jesus brings order to the world, rights wrong and seeks justice. He is supernaturally all-powerful – different than any human power of strength, money or government. Jesus slays the giants of sin and death for us. We can't achieve salvation on our own; it is a gift, which is at the very heart of the Gospel message.


