Speech for the Speechless

Have you ever found yourself speechless? It may have been a surprise (hopefully pleasant but not always the case). Maybe a teacher called on you to provide an answer. Maybe an answer was exactly what you wanted but life only left you with questions. It could be that some hardship has robbed you of your words. How can you possibly communicate, put into ordered words, an experience that seems so order-less?

The Psalms give a wealth and breadth of human experiences. Within these one hundred fifty poems, nearly every human possibility is explored. From the depths of soulcrushing despair to the heights of extolling God's goodness, and from the vastness of the universe to the intimacy of our inner life (our thoughts and feelings), the Psalms put into words what we sometimes cannot express.

First of all, read the Psalms. Make them a part of your Bible reading habit. Start with the first one and read through to the one hundred fiftieth one. Pick them up at random. The order really is not the primary concern. Read the Psalms. Even if you cannot identify with a particular one (because mercifully that experience is not one of your own), your eyes might be widened to how God's people follow the paths he has prepared for us. Maybe you can more fully appreciate another Christian in their own unique journey.

Second, join me as we explore these Psalms in more detail. On our church YouTube page (if you watch our livestream you are in the right place), I have several studies each week. Currently, I am going through (most of) the first fifty Psalms. Watch them in your spare time (which I realize may not be as much as you would like). Already, I have been struck by what the speaker is wrestling with, where he goes with his anger, his sadness, his joy, or his longing. I feel like I am right next to him, walking with him through some of the same experiences.

Expect the Psalms to surprise you, delight you, challenge you, and so much more. Much of God's Word is his communication to us. The Psalms are some of those few moments when people are talking to God, pouring out their souls because of the burdens they carry. Yet the Psalms will unrelentingly drive you back to God, our refuge, our shield, our

shepherd, our king. When you are speechless, these one hundred fifty prayers may give you exactly the right words to tell God what you are thinking and feeling.

Community. When I think of the word "community," my hometown pops into my head. Others may think general thoughts of city, the public or society. Maybe even common interests. Faith Lutheran is made up of a community of believers. Inside that community are other entities, separated by duties, responsibilities, functions and assignments. One of these is our Music Community.

Praise the One who breaks the darkness with a liberating light; Praise the One who frees the pris'ners, turning blindness into sight. Praise the One who preached the Gospel, healing ev'ry dread disease, Calming storms, and feeding thousands with the very Bread of peace.

Our music ministry just finished up its "season," so to speak, before the summer months set in. Over the past nine months or so, we've managed to convene our choir, the largest of our ensembles, about three times; whereas, the choir used to sing an anthem at least once a month, if not more. We've gone to short-term commitments. We've made do with small ensembles. I could not muster a full bell choir; we made do with smaller bell groups. Thankfully, we have a small pool of vocal and instrumental soloists and utilized some outside help to form additional instrumental ensembles.

Praise the One who blessed the children with a strong, gentle, word; Praise the One who drove out demons with the piercing, two-edged sword. Praise the One who brings cool water to the desert's burning sand; From this Well comes living water, quenching thirst in ev'ry land.

Some time ago, I read an article about current directions in church music. Dr. Michael Burkhardt, internationally-known composer, choral clinician, organist and hymn-festival leader, was asked what trends he thought would affect church music in the coming five-to-ten years. Surprisingly, or not surprisingly, these are his answers:

Increasing passivity and disinterest in music making and participation;

Continued and increasing use of sound track accompaniment and full recordings as a substitute for the real thing;

Continued and increased displacement of the centrality of worship by higher prioritization of other life activities.

It's disappointing to read something like that, and it takes away from the worship experience. It's a real challenge to recruit voices and approach people to take part in a music ministry. Believe me, I have heard every excuse in the book, ranging from 1) I'm too busy; 2) I've put my time in; 3) my family activities are my priority; 4) I'm not sure what I'm doing that

weekend (but whatever it is, it will no doubt take priority), and incredibly, one lady once said to me, "I need to talk this over with my cat! She's not used to me being gone Sundays."

That's not to say that family and other responsibilities aren't important, because they are. However, God also called us to be servants, and the faithful serve God among the faith community as long as they're alive. I've seen choirs disband -- here in our community and in my home church, where my dad sang into his 90's. It was important to him. When we use our gifts together, our community benefits. However, if you don't use your (musical) gifts, others get cheated.

Let us praise the Word Incarnate, Christ, who suffered in our place. Jesus died and rose victorious that we may know God by grace. Let us sing for joy and gladness, seeing what our God has done; Let us praise the true Redeemer, praise the One who makes us one.

Community is one way we can surround and defeat our personal enemy, Satan. In our current climate and culture of "It's all about me; my needs and ambitions," we need to walk and work with others. To experience growth, the community must be nurtured. What better way of expressing your love and declaring gratitude to your Creator than by singing His praises!
