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THE SEASON OF EASTER

Every so often, we change the color of the decorations in the sanctuary. You see green for a lot of the summer. You also might notice purple (a recent color) as well as blue, red, and white. The colors follow the seasons of the Church Year. The word "seasons" is moderately helpful. Just like you cannot be completely sure when spring will actually begin, some of these seasons move depending on the calendar year. Easter is one of those times and one of those seasons that moves.

The season of Easter officially runs from Easter Day until the Day of Pentecost (which is a red day). During this time, we give special attention to the resurrection of Jesus. Our readings include passages from Revelation that describe the future hope that we have in our crucified and risen Lord. Our Gospel readings begin with the results of Jesus rising from the dead. At the midway point, they transition into his Upper Room Discussion, where he gives encouragement and hope to the disciples as they face a life without Jesus physically present.

I believe we live in a season of Easter, of sorts. We live in the confidence and hope that comes from a resurrected and living Lord Jesus. We need to be reminded of the future that is certain and secure, not because of our works and doing but because of what Jesus has accomplished for us. We also need to be encouraged as we face a life without Jesus physically present with us.

There will be challenges. The first reading for each Sunday from Acts recalls a moment in the time of the apostles. For as much success as they had, there was frequent hardship and difficulty. Perhaps you can empathize with their situation, since it likely describes your own. The resurrection of Jesus is not just a story to be remembered every spring. It is a state of being by which we can endure the pitfalls of life. The season of Easter is the joyful expectation of eternal life with our Savior and with all who have departed in faith. He is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

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THANK YOU, MOM

"Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not turn from it." Proverbs 22:6

One of the most popular observances in the month of May is Mother's Day. It got me to thinking about my own mother. Mom grew up as an only child on a dairy farm in west central Minnesota during the Great Depression, and later, World War II. Her father was a German immigrant (I never knew him; he passed away suddenly when Mom was 20 years old), and her mother was a child of German immigrants. They were devout German Lutherans; my great-grandfather was a charter member of my home church, Immanuel Lutheran.

Let children hear the mighty deeds which God performed of old, Which in our younger days we saw, and which our parents told.

Mom was Valedictorian of her high-school graduating class and attended Macalester College and Interstate Business School. She worked for an insurance company, and later, the bank in my (our) hometown. She loved it, and after thinking about it, I can see why -- working with numbers -- the jobs were exact disciplines, which most definitely suited her personality. After she married my father, she gave it all up to raise a family. She did her best to shape being a wife and mother into an exact discipline.

Our sons and daughters we shall tell and they again to theirs, That generations yet unborn may teach them to their heirs.

Mother was very structured, and my brother and I didn't always follow her mandates. I've been told I absolutely refused to take a nap as a young child, which resulted in an early bedtime. Mom was very diligent about laundry, ironing, and cleaning on their specific days. She spent hours hanging the wash outdoors, starching and pressing my dad's white shirts (the ones guys used to wear to church), and waxing and polishing the wood floors until they gleamed. Many times we kids would run through the house, and more often than not, leave a black mark on her wood floors. (You can guess her reaction!) She would stand over me as I practiced my piano lessons, counting out loud, and making sure I knew them perfectly before heading to my lessons. Yes, perfectly.

O teach them with all diligence the truths of God's own Word, To place in Him their confidence, to fear and trust their Lord.

However, the things Mom (and Dad, too) was most assiduous about was directing the spiritual development of her children. A Christian upbringing focused on the importance of training and instructing her children to follow God's ways; we were in worship Every. Single. Sunday. And then off to Sunday School we went -- until we were seniors in high school! No excuses for missing! During my two years of catechesis, we were assigned a ton of memory work. I dug out my old catechism and counted up all the Bible verses we were required to memorize -263!! (That's probably about half the verses in the entire catechism.) That, in addition to the Six Chief Parts, questions and answers, required for our questioning. We had instruction Saturday mornings, from 9:00 am until noon (with one small break), September through May. (Very rarely, did anyone miss!) What does this have to do with Mom? I was expected to recite my memory work to her each week -- NO mistakes! Now, I don't remember EVERY verse I had to memorize, but I sure recognize them when reading the Bible or hearing them during the worship service.

To learn that in our God alone, their hope securely stands, That they may never doubt His love, but walk in His commands.

Mom was no-nonsense, and a strict disciplinarian. When I was a teenager, we butted heads frequently. She was not flexible and there was no grey area. (I was not a pampered princess!) Yet, when I think of everything she did for me, I knew she loved me. I often say the best gift she and Dad ever gave me was my faith.
